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Course Description:

In the past two decades, globalization defined as the integration of goods, labor and financial markets has been a powerful force in the global economy. It has led to heated debate. The debate has played vociferously into the political arena in every country and the international financial institutions.

The recent era of globalization is not unique. Evidence on migration, trade flows and capital flows suggests that integration in the 1870-1914 period was in some dimensions as extensive or more so than in the present. However just as in the current era, capital flows were fickle leading to waves of financial crises in the emerging economies of the day and calls for protection against free trade and mass immigration led to a backlash against globalization. The course will consider these issues.
